June and her late husband Ian (Cat Daddy) started the GCH rescue 15 years ago, and she has been rescuing and rehoming cats and kittens in need ever since. June has a dedicated team of volunteers, amazing website, Facebook, Twitter and Insta pages, some wonderful foster parents, and superb support from Voo Vets. Starting with two cats, June now has 13 permanent rescue residents, as well as 8 cats of her own, and 7 in long-term foster care. In 2022, there were 117 cat adoptions and 128 kittens, total of 245. This year so far there have been 13 cats and 10 kittens adopted. The rescue work is 24/7 and it thrives thanks to June's commitment, expertise, and care, along with fantastic support from volunteers and amazing followers. Thanks to June and all of you, GCH really is a very special place: a cat sanctuary.

Adoptions record

2022 was a hugely busy year for surrenders and adoptions at GCH. We think it was largely due to changes of circumstance as the country emerged from lockdowm and the cost of loving began to bite. In 2021, we facilitated 220 adoptions, and in 2022 it had risen to 245 (117 cats and 128 kittens). We are delighted that we were able to help so many people, but we worry that things aren't going to get any better for quite a while. We had a wonderful Christmas holiday period of adoptions, with a number of cats and kittens going to their forever homes for the New Year.

whom we hope will enjoy his retirement days with us.






Hope on Holiday

Long-term fostering

Fudge was our gorgeous old boy who came to us aged 17 in August 2019, after his owner died and her husband went to sheltered accommodation. Right from the start he was a lap cat, who was happy to potter around as long as he could jump up to get a cuddle. Fudge was a huge hit at our Cat Cafés because he wanted to sit on everybody. He would demand silver service for his breakfast out in the gazebo in summertime and on the sofa during the winter. He also made himself quite at home at Margaret's wool emporium during the last Easter

> bazaar. Shortly before Christmas, Fudge had a small fit and the vet identified a blood clot which he was being treated for, but on Christmas morning he suffered a saddle thrombosis, and sadly had to be put to sleep. At 20 years old, he had reached a grand old age, and

we all adored him. We miss him terribly, but it was a privilege to

know him for those 3 years. RIP, Fudge.





Babes was an adorable 15-year-old who came to stay in late October after



her owner died, but she had some health issues from the start. Her bloated tummy turned out to be an enlarged spleen and a biopsy showed that she also had an enlarged liver and pancreas. Firstly, Babes stayed with Natasha, but she turned out to be allergic to her, so then she was loved and cared for by foster mum Lea. Unfortunately, she was admitted to hospital with high temperature before Christmas, and by late December, she had



not eaten for a week despite appetite stimulants and a drip to help her kidneys. The vet felt she had given up and advised us to have Babes put to sleep. Babes was a beautiful girl who was unable to overcome her illnesses, but we loved her. RIP, Babes.

Holby Kitty

Our main expense as a rescue is our vet bills and 2022 was no exception. We have so many cats and kittens through our doors, that inevitably from time to time we come across some serious and unusual health issues. We are fortunate to have access to excellent surgeons at Voo Vets and generous supporters, who help out when we need extra financial assistance for such unexpected and difficult circumstances. Here are some of our recent stories:

Sabrina & Salina were born to Endora at the rescue at the end of



October, but developed respiratory infections in mid-January shortly after their first vaccination. While Salina made a quick recovery, Sabrina, was in intensive care for 8 days. She needed oxygen and a feeding tube, but eventually responded to treatment. She finally came home at the end of January, and both sisters were adopted by Hannah at the end of February. They are both on top form and doing really well.





Jaq came in with his mum Cinderella as a 3-week old kitten in September but developed FIP, a mutation of corona virus which he had picked up from his mum. He needed a course of antiviral medication Remdisivir (used in humans to treat COVID), if he were to survive. Fortunately, Voo had some at the surgery, and while it costs over £3000 for a 12 week course of tablets, they were able to let us have it in 10 day blocks, which made it more affordable. After a period of time in intensive care, Jaq responded really well to the medication and eventually was able to come home. He

is now reunited with his brother Gus. He has just had his 8 week review, and amazingly his bloods show almost everything is normal, so the drugs worked!! We shall be looking to rehome them as a pair.



Pebbles is our lovely 18-year-old, who came to live out her retirement days with us in October under Natasha's foster care. Underweight (and completely deaf) Pebbles turned out to have hyperthyroidism and a minor kidney infection, all of which are now being managed with medication. Her kidney levels are now normal, and she has a much brighter future.



Betsie, 18 months old, came to the rescue unvaccinated and pregnant with her brother Billy on 1 February. Unfortunately Betsie developed a respiratory infection, which couldn't be effectively treated becase of her pregnancy, and she ended up in intensive care. Now she has made a great recovery and has gone home to foster mum, Julie. Her babies are due any day, and we can't wait to meet them – well done Betsie!



Barclay is 16 years old and is one of our long-term foster cats living with Linda. In early November he had a minor episode which may have been a fit or a mini stroke, so the vets are keeping an eye on him but they have found nothing untoward so far. He began to have some trouble eating and so we arranged for him to have a dental at the beginning of February to get the troublesome teeth extracted. He is now recovering well and is back to his normal lovely self with Linda.

Ollie is our 17 year-old boy who came to us in December and is in foster care with Natasha. He has recently had a biopsy on a lump on his face and he will be having a dental next month for a suspected imapcted tooth.



Figgy, 5 months old, developed corona virus and a respiratory infection, ending up in hospital for a week. She has now finished her medication, and will be up for adoption, once she has been neutered next month. She is currently in foster care with Ellie and is back to being a normal, healthy kitten.



Among the resident cats, Tazz is still having problems with his pillowfoot, for which he needs steroid injections every 4 weeks. In January, Pitter Patter developed a skin condition, and needed a cone of shame, along with steroid injections. His condition is still being investigated. Millie

Moo is having some X-rays and tests as we are worried about her recent weight loss and blood tests, which showed some worrying markers. Unfortunatey she is terrified of going to the vets, but it has to be done!
