June and her late husband Ian (Cat Daddy) started the GCH rescue 15 years ago, and she has been rescuing and rehoming cats and kittens in need ever since. June has a dedicated team of volunteers, amazing <u>website</u>, <u>Facebook</u>, <u>Twitter</u> and <u>Insta</u> pages, some wonderful foster parents, and superb support from <u>Voo Vets</u>. Starting with two cats, June now has 15 permanent rescue residents, as well as 10 cats of her own, and 8 in long-term foster care. In 2023, there were 90 cat adoptions and 110 kittens adopted, a total of 200. This year so far there have been 36 cats and 41 kittens adopted. The rescue work is 24/7 and it thrives thanks to June's commitment, expertise, and care, along with fantastic support from volunteers and amazing followers. Thanks to June and all of you, GCH really is a very special place: a cat sanctuary.

Nelson




The biggest story of this quarter has undoubtedly been that of our lovely boy Nelson. We were contacted at the end of April about a badly injured cat; he was found and taken to Voo Vets by Lee and Julie on 1 May. His body condition was only 1/10. The poor cat had a fractured jaw, split palate, and a damaged eye, perhaps from an RTA. We called him Nelson, because of his damaged eye!

Nelson went straight into intensive care, and was being tube fed. All the vets & nurses fell in love with him because of his loving nature. A CT scan showed

that Nelson need and operation to repair his jaw and palate and remove his eye, which took place on 7 May. The operation was initially successful but Nelson crashed when coming out of anaeasthetic, had to be resuscitated by his surgeon. He then

had two seizures overnight and his life was hanging in the balance, but he held on and made it through the night. He then repsonded well to his feeding tube and showed amazing spirit all round.





After that, Nelson made a good recovery, he was taking his medication well and looking for cuddles. The vet decided he was well enough to come home to us on 13 May but he was very flat that day. June said we had never had a cat that frail and unwell and we were so worried that, after a few hours, we returned him to hospital. His glucose levels very low, but he was responding well at first. Then Nelson plateaued and started to lose weight, which was very worrying. More tests have shown he also has IMHA (Immune mediated haemolytic Anasemia) an autoimmune condition whereby the body attacks

its own red blood cells and delivers poor oxygen to the major organs. It requires steroids to help alleviate the condition. Nelson then developed an abscess in his eye socket which has now been treated with antibiotics. Nelson is responding well to those antibiotics and has put on a tiny bit of weight, which is encouraging. Unfortunately his palate and jaw are not healing quite as well as first hoped so he will now have to undergo more surgery at the beginning of June. Obviously we are very worried about this after last time, but we have no choice. He will not be able to eat properly until his jaw has been fixed, so the surgery is going ahead. Our healer Erica has been visiting him in hospital and says he is doing well.



We have had a fantastic response to our fundraising for Nelson. His vet bill is now over £13K much of which has now been covered by our very generous suporters. His treament still ongoing, but we think he is worth it. We have never seen such spirit in a cat, he has captured all of our hearts. We are praying that his second operation is successful, this gorgeous boy deserves a happy and healthy life.

The Family Tree



Another heart-warming story is that of the super-sisters Elm & Aspen who were abandoned by their owner. For months, they were being fed by their founder Clare who brought them in to when she realised they were both pregnant. We sent both girls to foster with our senior fosterer Julie.

After they gave birth to the Tree litter, sadly Aspen lost one of her kittens, but then the two



sisters both fed all the remaining kittens: Poplar, Spruce and Rowan. Then along came Joshua! Joshua was Serrano's kitten – she was only a baby herself and lost two of her kittens when she had an emergency caesarian. Joshua, the only survivor was rejected – Serrano was too young to be a mum. However Elm & Aspen were only too happy to step in. Joshua was adopted by them

and totally integrated with their kittens. They were all weaned together as a lovely family unit and Clare visited them often at Julie's. Now Joshua has been adopted with Rowan, and Poplar along with Spruce. Elm & Aspen have also gone off to their new home.

We were called out to rescue three kittens born in between two brick walls in the hot weather spell. Our intrepid pair Steve and Lee went to the rescue. At first there was no sign of mum, so we waited patiently and eventually Steve was able to trap mum and then scooped up the babies with a fishing net. They were taken straight to foster with Julie, and now mum and her babies are all doing really well. Twiglet is a great mum.



Bruno (11 wks) was surrendered to Voo Vets because he has plumbing issues like our lovely Memma. He will need surgery in a couple of months, but he is currently too young. He has toileting problems and is partially incontinent, so he needs regular bathing. Bruno is having problems with constipation, so we authorised a CT scan, which showed that his bladder is attached to his rectum, similar to Memma. Fortunately, it is fixable with surgery when he is a bit older. In the meantime, he will have weekly enemas and lactulose every day so we can keep him healthy till he is able to undergo surgery.

The finder of these two beautiful boys collected them when their owner threatened to leave them outside a charity shop. They are only 6 weeks old and too young to be separated from their mum. They are now safe in foster care with Julie.

Khan is 22 years old and was found wandering near Selsdon vets. His chip shows that he came from Enfield but it is not up-to-date so we can't find the owner. He is a lovely old boy, so we have brought him into the rescue, and he is going to foster with Julie.

Tazz [14]

June and her late husband Ian (Cat Daddy) found baby Tazz on the internet as a kitten, he was only 8 weeks old. From day 1, Tazz had a lot of health issues, and was not thriving, so he needed a lot of extra care. Tazz was always a mummy's boy. Even though he would spend a lot of his time roaming around outside, he would always come in a few times a day to cuddle with June by jumping up on her lap, putting his arms around her neck and dribbling on her! You could never keep him in for long though, he was an adventurous loner who loved to explore and climb things so he could view the world from up high.

About 6 years ago, Tazz mysteriously disappeared for 4 days. Eventually he came home by himself and Cat Daddy found him cowering underneath a car. It took ages to coax him back inside. We never found out what happened while Tazz was missing but then after that he developed pillow foot on his paw, and it came and went periodically after that. It wasn't too long before Tazz was back to his usual, loving self though.

At the beginning of last year, Tazz's pillow foot began to track up his leg and it became infected. For a while Tazz had to go to the vet daily to have his bandages changed, but he continued to have trouble with his leg wound healing, as he was not a fan of wearing a cone or taking medication. He was also diagnosed with stage 3 kidney disease at this time, which affected his healing. To protect his leg, we had to bring Tazz indoors but, somewhat surprisingly, he adjusted to indoor life really well. The pillow foot cleared on his paw but the leg wound never healed. He made friends with with Salzi and Shelby,





and he would climb up high on top of cupboards and pens, and sit surveying the scene. Tazz also became really affectionate with all the volunteers and and liked to sit on everyone's laps, not just his mum's! Now and then, he would make a dash for freedom, even trying to escape out of the top window once – June found him hanging from the window locks!

Recently Tazz had to have a dental, as he had some infected teeth. He was subdued after the operation and didn't seem like himself. We sent him in for more tests as he was refusing to take his pain and antibiotic medication (as usual!). Unfortunately those tests showed he had developed advanced heart and kidney disease, and he was going downhill quickly. June had to make the really difficult decision to have

her beloved boy PTS. June and Lee were with him as he went over the rainbow bridge, but he has left a huge hole in our hearts and we miss him greatly. RIP, our gorgeous boy Tazz.







Cuddles [15] came to us in August 2023 when his elderly owner went into care. The care worker Charlotte visited Cuddles daily and cared for him until the house was sold. Cuddles was due to become homeless, so we took him in. He was in long-term foster care with Caroline, who also fosters Taffy [13] for us and has a resident cat Hope [2]. Cuddles had some tummy issues from the beginning and always needed a special diet and steroids to try to manage it, with varying degrees of success. Caroline was stoic in maintaining his litter trays! He was an adorable, old boy who just wanted love and he received plenty of that from Caroline.

Cuddles was quite a character. He was very fussy with his food, and he even worked out how to get Taffy's microchip food bowl to work with his chip!! He liked to wake Caroline up in the morning by sitting on her chest, and then he retired to the garden room for the day and snoozed on the deck chair – it was as

if he had his own deluxe penthouse suite! Cuddles was not so keen on the other two cats, who have bonded, he preferred to do his own thing.

At the beginning of March, Caroline became concerned that Cuddles was subdued and not eating properly. We visited him at home that weekend to supervise him and arranged a vet visit for the Monday afternoon for a check-up. On Monday morning, he suddenly became floppy, so we changed his appointment to an emergency one that morning. Lee and Caroline rushed him to hospital, but tragically he passed away in the car on the way. Cuddles' decline was so sudden that we were all shocked and, even though he was an old boy, he had seemed in very good health. The vets suspected that he may have had kidney disease. He had a wonderful 9 months with Caroline and couldn't have asked for a better foster mum, she was distraught at his passing.

We then found out from Charlotte that Cuddles' previous owner, who had been taken into care, had passed away herself three weeks previously. She had rescued Cuddles as a kitten and had always adored him. She had remembered him at Christmas, saying 'Cuddles' with a big smile, when she saw his photo. Charlotte thanked Caroline for taking such wonderful care of Cuddles and for giving him a lovely home to live out his days. She believes that his previous mum was waiting for Cuddles to join her, and they are now reunited. We believe that too. RIP, Cuddles.








Roger [12] was found in a field by dog walkers in the middle of nowhere. He was named Roger by the vets, who thought he was about 4. He came to GCH at the same time as Shiloh. He was Julie's first ever foster and first foster fail! From the beginning, he had some health problems, so his first potential homing fell through: he had stud tail and swollen lymph nodes, so he became a long-term foster cat and settled in to rule the roost!

Roger bonded very quickly with resident kitten Bailey and 3-year-old George. He was always very loving and affectionate with people and other cats. He quickly became known as 'Uncle Roger' as he would groom the kittens, such as Blue and Skye, and would sleep alongside them. He

enjoyed playing with ping pong balls, and especially loved his Dreamies (no other brand but Dreamies would do!). He would even chaperone Julie to the toilet at night, much to her delight.



Over the years, Roger had mostly been healthy. He had some problems with his teeth and had to have few removed. Last year, he started to lose weight, and tests revealed that he had lymphoma. From that point he was on palliative care, and Julie decided to spoil



him rotten. He went onto daily steroids, and picked up quite well, remaining his good-natured, sweet self. But last week, Roger suddenly started to go downhill; he stopped eating and started hiding. Julie and Lee took him to the vet on Sunday 26th and, while there, the sad decision was taken to PTS with Julie and Lee at his side. Julie is devastated and George has been missing his companion and crying for him, but it was the right decision to let him go. RIP, lovely Roger.

Holby Kitty

Our main expense as a rescue is our vet bills, last year we spent in excess of £140,000. We have so many cats and kittens through our doors, that inevitably from time to time we come across some serious and unusual health issues. We are fortunate to have access to excellent surgeons at <u>Voo Vets</u> and generous supporters, who help out when we need extra financial assistance for such unexpected and difficult circumstances. In addition to Nelson and Bruno:



Remy [6mo]: After a while in her new home, Remi had two small seizures, affecting her sight; her pupils became huge and there was clearly a medical issue. We sent her for numerous tests including a spinal tap, which showed no coronavirus or FIP. A further CT scan showed toxocara. Her medical records showed she had the infection as a kitten in Bulgaria, which had been treated, but it had returned. Remi was put on medication for a month and has now completely recovered.

Elvis [12]: still has very unstable diabetes. His Libra 2 sensor records his progress daily. Elvis has his own iPhone and iCloud account, so we can monitor his progress 24/7 and we send the graphs over to our vets every day for inspection with their diabetes specialist. We then adjust his insulin levels accordingly. Elvis is making some progress with the low-carb food Bozita, but he is a work in progress and is under constant vet supervision. In himself, Elvis is well – he is bright and friendly, his coat is glossy, he has stopped overgrooming and he loves his food. In addition, the MRSA in his ears has almost totally cleared up. He certainly keeps us on our toes!





Harvey [17]: we originally homed Harvey in March 2021, but after 4 months he went missing. In early April, we got a call from Brelades vet in Dorking to say he had been found, as he was still chipped to us. His finder had been feeding him for 7 months but couldn't coax him in. Finally, Harvey was returned to us, and he went into foster care with our golden oldie specialist Natasha. We noticed he had a lump on his back, and we suspected cancer. We were initially unable to remove the lump because his thyroid levels were through the roof. When Harvey's thyroid was back under control, we had the lump removed, but sadly it was found to be cancerous. Harvey is now on palliative care. Harvey is bright in himself; he likes a groom and

purrs like a tractor. He is in safe, loving hands.

Calli [16+]: has been staying with Natasha since mid-January, since she was found wandering in the streets. She is almost completely blind and deaf and has a grade 4 heart murmur. On 7 April, Calli suffered a burst blood vessel in her 'good' eye, which initially blinded her. After an emergency dash to the vets, she was put on 11 doses of meds every day for a week. High blood pressure had left her with only partial sight in one eye. She is now on blood pressure and heart medication, and she is doing really well. Natasha looks after her golden oldies with great care.





Shiloh [7]: we became worried about Shiloh's intermittent limping; he potentially had some inflammation/ stiffness on his left hock. He was prescribed Metacam, antiinflammatories and joint supplements and we suspected possible arthritis. We noticed that he developed a sore paw, but blood test and an X-ray were inconclusive. We put Shiloh on bed rest and antibiotics in Kitty Haven for a week, much to his initial chagrin! Thankfully his paw has now healed, and his limp seems to have gone, but we'll keep a very close eye on him. Ellie May missed him a lot when he was indoors!

Hopper & Hawkeye [11mo] are in foster care with Lee. Both of them have been receiving ongoing treatment for FIP. Hopper is now in the observation phase of his FIP treatment, and he is doing well. Unfortunately, Hawkeye also has some joint problems in his right-hand front and back legs, which could be due to traumatic breech birth. A CT scan showed joint issues which require surgery to stabilise his leg joints; this hopefully should sort out his problems. We are now waiting for a date to go ahead with his surgery.





Memma [3] is our lovely hermaphrodite cat whose internal plumbing is all in the wrong place, causing her many medical issues. She lives with foster mum Julie. In April, Memma had a massive operation to reroute her urethra so that she can wee out of her tummy. This is helping to keep her numerus kidney infections under control. Memma still has some behavioural issues though, and is weeing out of the litter tray, which we are trying hard to resolve.

Kentucky [6] is our long-term foster cat, who was an RTA cat with bladder and bowel damage from fractures in his pelvis when he came to us in April 2021. He currently lives

with foster mum Louise. Kentucky has been to the vet about his ongoing urinary/ bowel problems and some sickness. He has had numerous tests including an ultrasound, X-ray and blood tests for thickening of intestines and high inflammation markers. He is currently on prescription ZD food and antibiotics. Kentucky has also just had an



endoscopy which showed inflammation of the bowel, and he possibly will require steroid treatment to help improve his problems. We hope to be able to find a solution for him soon when we get biopsy results from the endoscopy.



Shelby [8mo] has been on Remdesivir for FIP, with ongoing blood tests, and he is making very good progress. His bloods returned to normal, he put on weight,

and he responded well to the meds. Shelby is now in his 80 day observation period, and he should then be able to go up for adoption.



Maxwell [6mo] had a bad reaction to a shaving patch after some blood tests. He had a sore patch, which was irritating him and was not healing as it should. After a week wearing a sphinx top, the wound healed, and he was back to normal. He has since been adopted.



Tommy [1] came to us in September with his back legs paralysed from a crush injury. He had two major spinal surgeries and has been recuperating with his foster mum Jackie. He is still a little bit wobbly, so he will always need to be an indoor cat. Tommy still has 6 monthly check-ups, but his physio is now finished – he is doing really well. He is very happy with Jackie and has bonded with her resident pair Willow & Pixie.

Eevee [3] is our deaf cat currently in foster with Lindsay. When she went in for her spay, they found she has heart problems. We arranged for a heart scan which showed, Eevee has a bad heart murmur and arrhythmia, so her heart is under strain. She is well in herself – with no symptoms. She had an ECG harness on for 24 hours, and she will have special heart drugs from next week. Then we can do another ECG scan and, all being well, will then be able to spay her. She is a lovely, sweet girl.




