June and her late husband Ian (Cat Daddy) started the GCH rescue 15 years ago, and she has been rescuing and rehoming cats and kittens in need ever since. June has a dedicated team of volunteers, amazing website, Facebook, Twitter and Insta pages, some wonderful foster parents, and superb support from Voo Vets. Starting with two cats, June now has 14 permanent rescue residents, as well as 10 cats of her own, and 8 in long-term foster care. In 2022, there were 117 cat adoptions and 128 kittens, total of 245. This year so far there have been 88 cats and 102 kittens adopted. The rescue work is 24/7 and it thrives thanks to June's commitment, expertise, and care, along with fantastic support from volunteers and amazing followers. Thanks to June and all of you, GCH really is a very special place: a cat sanctuary.

Xmas Bazaar



We were delighted to raise £7820 at our Christmas Bazaar at the Willow Tree pub on Saturday 25 November, which is a record amount. Thank you to all the volunteers, without whom it would not have been possible: those who helped set up and ran stalls on the day, and those who priced items, and offered their time (and their cars) to ferry goods around in the weeks leading up the event. We even had our very own Santa Steve! We are so fortunate to have so many loyal and enthusiastic supporters. Medical Miracles

Tommy came to us in mid-September paralysed in his back legs after being sat on



by the family dog. His first operation for a ruptured disc in his spine was successful and he was put on 8 weeks pen rest. Unfortunately during that time, he slipped another disc, the next one down on his spine, and was paralysed again. After further surgery and pen rest, slowly gradual movement is returning to his legs. He has a special letter tray with a cutout section, and now he is tentatively standing and walking. Jackie bathes him



3-4 times a week and exercises his back legs. The vets are very happy with the outcome of his surgery, and he is now having physio sessions as well. While he is healing well, there is a long way to go, but we are hopeful that, in time, Tommy will make a full

recovery. He is currently being fostered with Jackie who is able to give him the intensive care and daily physio he needs. Tommy is a playful boy, who loves to watch what the other cats are doing. For a while he was only eating poached fish in milk, but is now eating Lily's Kitchen. The physio is really pleased with his progress. He is such a brave boy!

Elodie & Evie developed watery eyes in the week after their adoption in September. This



unfortunately developed into a very serious eye infection, and they were diagnosed with calcicvirus & chlamydia. Initially, they were danger of losing their eyes, if their corneas had ruptured. They were released back into our care and went into intensive care in hospital. Upon returning to the rescue, there followed weeks of intensive medication every four hours, which is ongoing. By a miracle, it now looks as if their eyes will be saved, though their vision may be impaired. They will be



having specialist care for foreseeable future, but their prognosis is looking much brighter. The vets have detected pressure behind their eyes, which is positive, but they might have corneal scarring. They are still on 6 hourly meds, but we are now confident that they will at least have some vision. They are playful and friendly girsl,



very sweet and totally bonded. They have been having vet checks every three days but going forward it will be weekly.

Hopper & Hawkeye After 4 months in foster care with Lee, in late October Hopper



developed a high temperature and fluid belly. We were devastated when he was diagnosed with FIP (a mutation of coronavirus). This is no longer a death sentence, so we began immediate treatment with Remdesivir. Hopper was admitted to hospital for 8 nights. He had 7 days of injections, and now must have 77 days of oral meds, with regular blood tests and scans to monitor his fluids. We are delighted that he has responded brilliantly and quickly to the treatment as we caught it so early because of Lee's vigilance. We are delighted that Hopper is doing really well.



Two days after Hopper returned home, Lee noticed that his brother Hawkeye was also under the weather with a temperature. Hawkeye also tested positive for FIP (though it is not infectious). He was not carrying extra fluid, but he had enlarged lymph glands. Hawkeye then spent 6 nights in hospital, and he is now undergoing the same course of medication as Hopper. We are now slightly concerned that Hawkeye has an issue with his joints and may need a CT scan.



New arrivals in the last three weeks:



Fonzie just turned up on our doorstep all by himself in an advanced state of starvation and dehydration. He has had a full set of tests, and there is nothing wrong with him except severe malnutrition, so it is hard for him to keep his food down. He was on intensive care on a drip, but now he is back home with us. He will have B12 injections for next 6 weeks, and folate supplements while his body heals. We hope Fonzie will a full recovery, he has put on a little bit of weight to 2.9 kilos. He will be going to foster with Dee this week.

Eleanor Rigby is a stray who gave birth to her four kittens in a shed. Her finders had been searching for her owners for a while, to no avail, but they became concerned when Eleanor gave birth outside and called us. Mum and babies are doing really well.



Harrison had been spotted for a few weeks hanging around a local school. Eventually a concerned member of the public brought him in to us, but he was covered in fleas and had a dodgy tummy. Harrison is currently in foster with Katerina. We were concerned about his tummy, but his vet check showed nothing serious, even though the problem remains. He has been given worming treatments and we are monitoring him closely, so we are now doing faecal samples to see if that can shed any light on his condition.

Shelby is only about 8 weeks old. He was found by the side of a road in Birmingham, and his finders brought him down to London, but were unable to keep him. He was covered in fleas, and very lethargic for a few days, but after being defleaed, he has brighter moments. His demeanour is still up and down, as is his temperature. So far, he has been negative for all tests, and we hope he has turned a corner. He is a dear, wee thing.





Elvis is about 8 years old and was abandoned by his owners about a year ago. The finders became increasingly concerned as he appears to have trouble walking, so we brought him in. The vets ran tests on him, an no injuries showed up. He then has a spinal tap which showed nothing; we now suspect he may arthritis of the spine and he will need an MRI scan. At 6kg, he is a big boy, who sings like an angel for his breakfast! Hence his name!

Joey is a 5 month old kitten who was rejected by his mum and both his siblings. He is currently in foster with Julie, and he is settling in well getting to know her crew.



Over The Rainbow Bridge



Boro [20] was found wandering the streets in April 2023. She had gone missing from her previous home and was very unwell with dementia. We found her owner, but she was not able to give Boro the medical care she needed, so we took Boro into respite care. She was fostered initially with Steve, then Nina and finally with Natasha. Eventually her fur all grew back, and she began to put on weight. She loved all her special food, but she did have a permanently grumpy demeanour (partly because she didn't get on with Natasha's other foster cat Pebbles!). She liked to sit on



the bathroom ledge, and she come for occasional cuddles. For six months, Boro really thrived under Natasha's care, and she was loving her new life. In September, however, she began to decline, stopping eating and drinking, and we suspected kidney failure. On 27 September we made the decision to have her put to sleep with June, Lee & Natasha at her side. She lived a long life, and she knew safety and love for her last six months with us. RIP Boro, our gorgeous girl.









Mila was only 19 months old when she came to us with a severe heart condition. We were contacted by Voo Vets when her owners were unable to afford her treatment, and she needed a specialist scan and potentially palliative care. At first, we thought Mila had a congenital heart issue, based on her age and the volume of fluid around the heart. She came out of hospital for few days, but she was under par, so we had her readmitted. We were very worried that there was no hope for her. Our vets



brought the specialist heart scan forward because they were so concerned but the scan showed that Mila's condition might not be congenital. She had pulmonary hypertension and fluid around her heart which they hoped could be treated once we knew the cause. Mila was on new medication and had made some improvement back at the



rescue; she was doing quite well. Her first scan did not give the vets all the information they needed so we planned for her to have a more extensive CT scan. Unfortunately, the fluid returned around her heart and her condition deteriorated unexpectedly and rapidly. The vets advised us that there was nothing more they could do for her, and the kindest thing would be to let her sleep. Poor Mila had such a short life, but we loved her in the short time we had her. RIP, sweet girl.

Holby Kitty

Our main expense as a rescue is our vet bills and this year has been no exception. We have so many cats and kittens through our doors, that inevitably from time to time we come across some serious and unusual health issues. We are fortunate to have access to excellent surgeons at Voo Vets and generous supporters, who help out when we need extra financial assistance for such unexpected and difficult circumstances. As well as our medical miracles and the new arrivals already mentioned, here are some of our other recent stories:

Hula came in to us pregnant and she had one kitten on 12 September then no more. We took her in for a in for a scan, and she had a mummified kitten inside her. She has now been spayed but has a post-spay infection, which is being invesitigated and treated, but she is now coming home from hospital. Todd came in as an unvaccinated stray and he tested positive for Calici/mycoplasma/toxicara/isapora. He took a long time to shake it all off but is now back in full helath and he is up for adoption. He is an adorable boy who loves to play. Pitter Patter has been up and down with his calicivirus which sometimes affects his skin. But he has been on antibiotics and he is now well again, and back to his incorrigable self!







Marina had an allergic reaction to the stitches used for her spay, and had a coourse of antibiotics. She stayed in hospital overnight but she has made a full recovery and been adopted. Blackberry (one of the Brambles) had a flare up of his coronavirus, with some fluid on his lungs. At first the vet thought he may have FIP, but fortunately that was a false alarm and, after a short hospital stay, he has returned home. Tailor came in as a stray and she was carrying tritrichomonas, a parasite, which was sorted with medication – her kittens have ongoing tummy problems, but all tests have come up negative so we now suspect IBS, which will be treated with diet.







Monsoon was under par when she first came in with her kittens and they had bad tummies. They have undergone tests and are positive for coronavirus; the symptoms are being treated. Jenny [10] came to us after her owner died. She has been on the streets for 18 months. She had a skin infection, which is now better, and a bad tummy. She has tested positive for chlostridium, which is treated with antibiotics. She is an affectionate and needy girl who is just looking for love and her forever home. Michaelangelo was one of Olivia's kittems who developed coronavirus. His symptoms were treated with antibiotics and he is now doing very well.







Margarita had a touch of constipation, but a quick vet visit and some sorted it out. Kane had an eye infection, which was treated with antibiotics. Rain had a high temperature, and was admitted to hospital but is now doing really well.







Bellatrix had a post-spay infection, another bad reaction to sutures, but she has had antibiotic treatment. Logan was admitted to hospital with a very high temperature and had some x-rays under sedation, which showed a distended bladder and hard stools in his intestines. He has a suspected severe urinary infection. Logan is on antibiotics, anti-inflammatory medication and IV fluids while they monitor him, but his temperature has, thankfully, returned to normal so he is on his way home.





In December we are raising money for the CT scans for Elvis








