June and her late husband Ian (Cat Daddy) started the GCH rescue 15 years ago, and she has been rescuing and rehoming cats and kittens in need ever since. June has a dedicated team of volunteers, amazing website, Facebook, Twitter and Insta pages, some wonderful foster parents, and superb support from Voo Vets. Starting with two cats, June now has 15 permanent rescue residents, as well as 11 cats of her own, and 8 in long-term foster care. In 2023, there were 90 cat adoptions and 110 kittens adopted, a total of 200. This year so far there have been 13 cats and 20 kittens adopted. The rescue work is 24/7 and it thrives thanks to June's commitment, expertise, and care, along with fantastic support from volunteers and amazing followers. Thanks to June and all of you, GCH really is a very special place: a cat sanctuary.

Love Me Tender



Elvis came to us in November, having been on the streets for about 4 years after his owners left him behind. He is approximately 10 years old, but he has many health issues. He has diabetes, pancreatitis, mycoplasma, MRSA in his ear, and neurologicial issues, but he is now receiving treatment for all of them. Elvis has weekly vet visits for sugar curves, and twice daily insulin injections. His diabetes is unstable, so he has been in and out of hospital, but Voo is doing a great job of managing his condition. Elvis is on a strict regime of many medications,



but he is very stoic about it all, and he gets to mooch out of his pen for a bit every day. We have to keep a very close eye on him! He is the most adorable cat with a lovely temperament. He does love his food (hence his 6kg weight!), especially the fresh chicken he gets as a treat, and he sings loudly for his supper! Now he is back home with us and doing very well, being spoiled rotten by everyone who meets him. He even gets his own post! Welcome to the GCH family, Elvis!!









Shelby [6mo] was found by the side of the road in Birmingham, with a temperature, bad eyes and neorological issues (he may have cerabellar hypoplasia). His founders brought him to London and then to us. While his eyes are now fine, he tested coronapositive, and had a tender tummy. At first he seemed to be doing well but then he became listless, so we took him back to the vets with raised a temperature. They confirmed that Shelby had




developed FIP, and would need 86 days of Remdesivir treatment, half a tablet a

day. We did Ping-A-Pound to raise the £4-5000 his treament and care is likely to cost. In addition, Shelby has a pulmonary hernia which will need treatment, so he is going through a lot! The vets and nurses all fell in love with him. Now Shelby is back home with us, he is on his medication and is doing really well. He will have blood tests every couple of weeks for the foreseeable future, but the vets are very pleased with his progress. It is been lovely to see him start to play like a normal kitten for the first time. We look forward to the day we can find him a forever home, but there is a long way to go!



Never Ending Story

Falkor [5mo] was surrendered to us just before Christmas. He was 9 weeks old but had a bad tummy, coronavirus, chlostridium and was very underweight. After lots of love and care, he has blossomed with us. He is now clear of all his infections and is litter trained. He integrated so well and so quickly with the GCH family that we have decided to keep him. He is firm friends with Tiny Tony – the pair of them race around all day and then collapse on the sofa. Falkor has put on weight (he is now 2.3kg) and is a gorgeous ball of fluff. He recently developed a problem with his eye (we think it got scratched while playing with Tony),











New arrivals in the last few weeks:



Serrano & Joshua: Serrano, only six months old, was brought into Voo Vets (Battersea) having given birth to one kitten at home. After waiting 24 hours, the owners had brought her in, and she needed an emergency C-section. Tragically, she had two more kittens dead inside her. Serrano is no more than a baby herself and she was showing no interest in her new-born baby; she had no milk and was not washing or caring for him. She was just too young to be a mum. When the owners surrendered mum and baby, the vets called us. We assessed mum and started bottle-feeding her baby, Joshua, who only weight 70g. When Serrano continued to show no interest, we





sent him over to our nursing mums, Elm & Aspen, who are

in foster care with Julie. Straight away, both mums (sisters) started to tend and feed him, he has integrated beautifully with their three kittens. Hopefully now

Joshua will thrive, he has already put on weight (now 120g), but he is not out of woods yet. Serrano was spayed when she had her C-section, but there have been some complications with her stitches which needed re-doing. She is a lovely girl who will flourish when we get her home. Mum & baby are both safe with us now.



Elm & Aspen [9mo]: Finder Clare reported feeding 2 cats [9 mo] who had been abandoned by



her neighbour. Clare was concerned as both cats were pregnant, so she called us. We rescued Elm, and she was fostered with Julie. Elm had 2 babies, Ash & Rowan, two days later, and one stillborn. We had left a

carrier to collect the other cat, Aspen, who then came back after 48 hours no longer pregnant! This meant her kittens were somewhere close by. Thankfully, mum Aspen & her 2 kittens, Poplar & Spruce, were found in a bamboo thicket 2 doors down and we were able to rescue them as well. All

are now with Julie; the mums wanted to be together so now they are all in one big pen and co-parenting. Sadly, we lost Ash after a couple of days, but the other kittens are all doing well. Now Elm & Aspen are also both foster mums to tiny Joshua. What a fantastic integrated family this is!





Ariel [9mo]: was brought in to us as a stray. She has a swollen tummy, which may be pregnancy or another issue, we are having tests done to see what the

problem is. She is quite lethargic, so all is not well. Ariel is currently in foster care with Dee & Andy, but we are getting her the best care, and she is already settling in well.

Betty Boop [6mo]: was left on our doorstep in a carrier late one night earlier this month when June was already asleep. We found her in the porch in the morning, cold, hungry and nervous but well enough. She is a dear little thing but has been through a lot of

trauma. She has now had her first vaccination and vet check and, apart from inflamed gums, she seems healthy. Betty has just been spayed and has a lovely new crocheted collar courtesy of her foster mum Katerina.






Lady Diana [8 mo]: was found crying outside her finder's house, so they brought her to us. She was emaciated, so we sent her off to foster at Julie's to get her fed up again. She has been spayed and had her tooth fixed, and she has now been adopted by the lady who found her and fell in love with her. We do love a happy ending!

Zoe & Mori [2]: were surrendered to us due to allergies. They are absolutely adorable BSH cats who stayed with us for a month in Kitty Haven. It took us a while to find the perfect forever home for them, but they have now

been adopted to a wonderful home and they are doing really well.



Harry's Game: We received a call on Tuesday 6 February from a lady who works in a



builders' yard in Leatherhead, Surrey. They had found a young, ginger, one-eyed cat in the yard earlier on the Monday and were worried about its safety, so they were holding on to it in their office. They had him scanned and he had a chip, but it was not registered. We sent Lee out to collect the cat and brought him back to our rescue in Worcester Park. When we scanned him, we found that the owner details were in fact registered. The chip company then put the owner in contact with us.

It turns out that Harry's owners live near Gatwick, and he had gone missing on Saturday. Somehow Harry had hitched a ride all the way to Leatherhead!! His owner was crying with joy and came to pick him up on Tuesday evening. She had only had him a few months. Harry is an Arabian Mau from the Middle East. His owner had not realised his chip was not registered until he went missing and so she had registered the chip with Microchip Central on Monday, the day before we collected him.

Because Harry's chip was registered, we were able to reunite them the same day he came to us. So, the moral of the story is: get your cat chipped and, if you take a foreign cat in, make sure the chip is also registered. It was such a pleasure to reunite them, and his owner was so thrilled. Another cat reunited with his owners this month was Monty, who had somehow travelled a 20 minute drive away to Worcester Park. Fortunately, he also was chipped, so we were able to reunite him with his owners within 24 hours.



Spring Cleaning!



The winter months are when we are able to do some of our refurbishment and DIY projects, if we get the chance! This January we were able to finally do some refurbishment of Kitty Palace. Steve made us some fantastic, fitted shelves and then we had to paint them all. It took a while as the work had to be fitted in around cat feeds and cleaning, but we got there in the end.





Another project we have been wanting to do for a couple of years was clearing the garage and shed of years' worth of stuff which been taking up valuable storage space. It was a daunting task but, with the help of some fantastic volunteers, we got both areas sorted in the course of one long weekend. The is now room for us to fill it all up again with car boot and bazaar items! Thank you so much to Tony from Fairmile Waste who took away the mountain of rubbish for us!



Our next project is the redecoration of downstairs, which has needed doing for a few years! Now that we are in a slightly quieter period, we are able to do a full paint job of the walls, ceiling and woodwork. It isn't a job that can be done all in one go as the rescue continues to operate, but we can squeeze in a few hours every day (as long as Tiny Tony goes into a pen!). We estimate that the whole job will take a month, but we are making good progress. Thank you to all the volunteers, particularly Jackie, who are helping out as and when they can.







Over The Rainbow Bridge

Jenny [10] came to us at the end of October. She had been on the streets for 18 months, after

which never quite we she could get the one chlostridium, which is affectionate and need than when she curled

her owner died. She had a bad skin infection, which we treated, and a bad tummy which never quite went away. Jenny went to foster with Steve in November, where she could get the one-to-one attention she deserved. She had tested positive for chlostridium, which is treated with antibiotics and a steroid injection. She was an affectionate and needy girl who was just looking for love and she was never happier than when she curled up on Steve's lap at night.

In early February, Jenny stopped eating, so we rushed her in to hospital. She had developed bronchial pneumonia, and within

hours she was critical and on oxygen. That same day she died of

heart failure on the table. We were so shocked by her sudden deterioration, that we had a post-mortem done. It showed that Jenny had a serious underlying heart condition, cardiomyopathy, which had been exacerbated by

her time on the streets. We were devastated that she died so quickly and unexpectedly, but we take comfort from knowing that she had love, warmth and comfort in the last few months of her life with Steve. RIP, Jenny.

Pebbles [20] came to us in October 2022. She was a lovely, old, deaf girl with



dementia, thyroid and kidney conditions, whose owners were no longer able to care for her. We placed her with foster mum Natasha who is an expert with the older cats, to make her as comfortable as possible in her retirement and to give her expert palliative care. We were astonished when Pebbles thrived at Natasha's house and settled in very well. Though she was never keen on other foster cats who came to stay, she would follow Natasha around, sitting on her lap and demanding attention. Despite her

grand old age, she would still chase springy toys around the kitchen at 4am!

Pebbles did have a lot of health issues, but she got good food, her medication twice a day as well as lots of love and attention. In November, Pebbles celebrated her year anniversary with

Natasha, which none of us had expected, and all seemed well. But about a week ago, she became very fussy about her eating and seemed frail; her weight also started to drop off. Natasha became worried that Pebbles was just wasting away so we made an appointment at the vets. The day before the appointment, her back legs went so we made the hard decision to have Pebbles put to sleep. Natasha and Lee went with her, and she fell asleep in Natasha's arms. Pebbles was a feisty, slightly grumpy old lady, but Natasha adored her. We were privileged to have given her just over a year of love and care. RIP, Pebbles.





Holby Kitty

Our main expense as a rescue is our vet bills, last year we spent in excess of £140,000. We have so many cats and kittens through our doors, that inevitably from time to time we come across some serious and unusual health issues. We are fortunate to have access to excellent surgeons at Voo Vets and generous supporters, who help out when we need extra financial assistance for such unexpected and difficult circumstances. In addition to Elvis & Shelby:

Eleanor Rigby [1] & the Beatles litter - Maxwell, Lucy, JoJo & Sergeant Pepper:

Eleanor was an unvaccinated stray who came in with her 4 one-day old kittens. She had a number of respiratory infections so she went into hospital

quickly along with her babies. When Eleanor came out , sadly, she had to be separated from them, and she has gone to foster with Majella. The kittens then had raised temeratures so we had them re-admitted to intensive care for a week. Maxwell was touch & go for a little while. When they came home, the babies were 8 weeks old so they were bottle-fed for a week, and they are now all back to full health and are bouncing around! JoJo has recently been treated for an eye ulcer but all now seems well.









Elodie & Evie [9mo] came to us August, but they developed a serious eye



infection shortly after their adoption in September, so we took them back into our care. At first they were in danger of having to have their eyes removed, but with a rigourous medication ritual (2 hourly at first) and thrice-weekly trips to the vets, we managed to pull them back from the brink. They were spayed in Janaury and now just need twice daily eyedrops. The girls are still under our vets' care, and have a check-up every two weeks, but they have good vision and



have recovered well from their early trauma. They are now allowed out of their pen all day and they love exploring.



Elodie & Evie are doing really well and we are currently looking for the perfect forever family for them. They are an adorable, playful, affectionate pair who have made brillliant progress. Because of their eyes, we would ideally like them to be indoor cats or a home wth a catio. We will pay for their check-ups and eye drop medication for the first year of their adoption. They are really good about their eye-drops, but is is essential for them in order to keep their eyes healthy. We are happy to show any prospective owners how it is done, so there is nothing to worry about. They are a super pair of cats, ideal for a family!

Shane [5mo] was found abandoned in Hounslow and was then surrendered by his new owners who were leaving the country. When he came to us he had calicivirus, bordatella, mycoplasma, and an upper respiratory infection. Shane was treated with antibiotics and now he is all better. He had a great time here running around with his new friends Falkor and Tiny Tony. Shane has now been adopted by one of our followers who has two other GCH cats Orbit & Phoenix, who will be great company for him. We'll miss him.





Hopper & Hawkeye [9mo] of the Tennis litter are still having their treatment for FIP. Hawkeye continues to have joint issues, which could be FIP related. They are now coming to the end of their Remdesivir treatment,

which has worked wonders, and they will then have a 3 month observation phases. The boys will remain in foster with Lee until they are well enough to be rehomed. Tazz [14], one of our GCH senior cats, still has some problems with his pillowfoot and his leg is irritating him slightly, but he is vastly improved from this time last year when we were so worried about him. He has now fully transformed into being an indorr cat.





Memma [2] still suffers from frequent urinary infections because her internal plumbing is too close togerther and her bowel infects her bladder. As a result she also has kidney damage. One solution is to reroute her urethra so that it expels out of her tummy. This is an expensive opration, but one which we shall be exploring soon, as it will make her quality of life so much better. Roger [4] is a long-term foster (with Julie), who was recently diagnosed with lymphoma. He is now on palliative care and steroids and is getting all the love and care he deserves.





Tommy [7mo] is our gorgeous boy who came to us paralysed in his back legs after an accident at home. After two spinal operations, and ongoing physioterapy, Tommy is currently in foster with Jackie, who is able to give him specialised one-to-one care. Tommy is now out of his pen during the day, and is ntegrating with her two cats Willow & Pixie. He has learned to walk again and we are delighted with his current prognosis. Our lovely Gracie [4] developed a respiratory infection, which was treated with antibiotics and is now clear. Persians are very prone to respiratory issues because they have very flat faces so their



tear ducts and noses don't drain properly. Gracie is back to her usual naughty self!



Harrison [6mo] had some tummy troubles when he first came to us. He tested positive for chlostridium, and he was treated with antiobiotics while staying with his foster mum Katerina. He has now been adopted. Shimmy [5mo] has a grade 2 heart murmur, and is being kept under observation by the vets. He has been at foster with Ann & Simon along with his sister Lindy, and we are delighted that they have decided to keep the siblings permanently.





Bramble [1] was recently under par and limping, but after a vet visit and a few days observation he seemed to recover. Sookie [5] who is in foster with Julie has had to have 6 teeth removed and was spayed at the same time, but she is now recovering well.





Our lovely old boy Salzi [14] has an upper respiratory infection which has left him with a very snotty nose; he in now on a course of antibiotics to clear it. He is now feeling a lot better, and he has been very good about his medication.

Kentucky [6] our long-term foster cat, who was an RTA cat with bladder and bowel damage, has been to the vet about his ongoing urinary problems and some sickness. He is having numerous tests including an ultrasound, X-ray and blood tests for suspected pancreatitis, which would explain the sickness. We'll get to the bottom of it as foster mum Louise is worried!





JoJo [4mo] has an eye ulcer developed from a scratch, he has been having 6 lots of eye drops a day, but it is healing well. Maxwell [4mo] has a sore neck where he was shaved to take blood, which may have become infected, so he is now being treated for that.





Falkor [5mo] also has an eye scratch, he is on eye drops and has just had a swab done, which should give us more information about what is causing the issue.

Lady Diana [18 mo] had her tooth fixed before being adopted by her finders.





Fonzie [2] brought himself to us on the doorstep, emaciated and starving; he was in a pitiful state, but he has slowly been nursed back to health under the foster care of Dee & Andy, and he has just been adopted.

Ariel [9mo] still waiting for results on her tests, but she has a swollen tummy which needs investigating.





Remi [7mo] one of our beautiful Bulgarian kittens unexpectedly has had two small seizures, shortly after being adopted by Lisa. He is having tests, and we are hoping to get it resolved and treated quickly. Serrano [6mo] was restitched after her emergency C-section stitches started to come undone. She is now back home with us and is recovering.





GCH International

We are very proud of our connections with international Rescues in Greece, Bulgaria and Dubai. A few times a year we are able to take in some foreign cats for rehoming. The Friends litter came to us courtesy of Xristiana in Greece. The last two, Rachel & Chandler, were recently adopted. Hope 2 came from Tails of Hope in Bulgaria and she was adopted by our foster mums Caroline, who already looks after Cuddles and Taffy for us.







Remi, Bodhi and Willow are three gorgeous kittens who arrived from Tails of Hope in Bulgaria on 13 January. They were taken off the streets unwell with eye infections from chlamydia. They spent 3 months at the vets in Bulgaria, but they received a clean bill of health before they were allowed to travel. They would have been put back on the streets if they had stayed in Bulgaria, so we did a special raffle to help with their transport costs and brought them over to GCH. They stayed with us for a month while we assessed them and now they have been adopted by Lisa. This bonded threesome is doing very well with their new mum Lisa. Remi is currently undergoing tests as he has had two small fits since being adopted.

In December, supporter Gill (mum of Miss Molly) and her friends raised £267 for us with her Knitted Items Sale. Thank you so much, Gill!




Pets Corner


